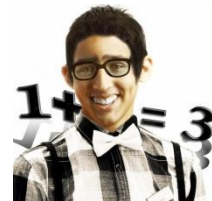

## How to                      at team teaching

- Skit making/role playing
- “1 minute chat”
- 1 on 1 Q & A with ALT
- Interview Game with or w/o Cards
- Pair and group reading
- Row Game --multiple variations
- 8 Questions/Warm-Up
- Use Classroom English
- “Picturing” and guessing the meaning
- Evaluate and correct student’s work
- Reading and Vocabulary Practice/ Repetition --but fun!
- Visual Aid preparation

### I. Be a positive addition to your JTE



- Diversify examples and make them fun
  - “This is a  .”, “Sing a song”, “read a book”, ...
- Natural English please
- Teach the kids things that aren’t in the textbook, they’ll dig it!
- Mini-games !!

英語でなんという？ *How do you say ~~~ in English ?*

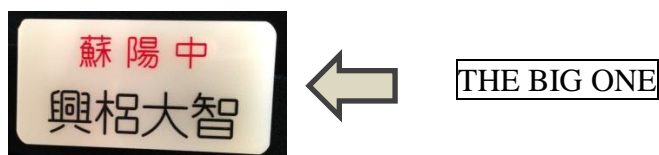
スペルは？ *How do you spell ~~~ in English ?*

*How many students in your row ?*

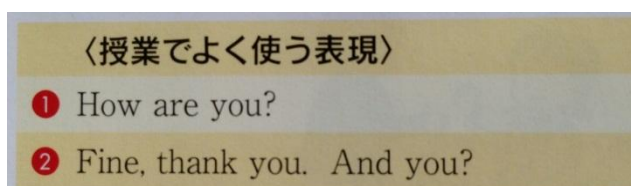
*Thank you. You're welcome.*

### IV. How to connect with your students

- Ride the grey area between teacher and friend
- Make fun of everything and anything (all at once), especially yourself!
- Give some students English nicknames!



- Multiply interactions
  - Eat/Clean with the students
  - Hang in the hallways during lunch break
  - High fives, technical high fives
- Break the “I’m fine, thank you, and you ?” answering pattern



- Use pop culture references to illustrate grammar points  
→ How to find cultural references ?

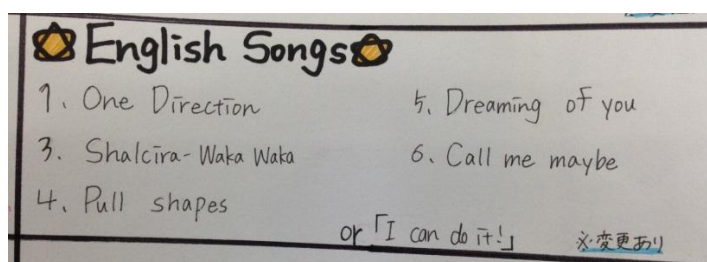


< Open their pencil cases and ask about everything of interest to you >
